HONORING KERRY HALL: The Town Hall was full of good cheer on September 13th as we celebrated Mr. Kerry Hall's **40 years of service to University Park**. In addition to his family, friends, and colleagues, former Mayors Harold Freeman and John Brunner were able to attend and spoke with humor and respect about Mr. Hall. Mayor Tabori presented Kerry with a commemorative forty-year plaque. Mr.

Brunner regaled the celebrants with stories about the joys of snow removal, and how Kerry had come to be appointed the head of that operation. Mr. Freeman noted the huge savings that Kerry had made possible because of his skills as a mechanic and his ability to find the best bargains when major equipment was needed for the Public Works Department. In turn, Kerry Hall spoke and promised to be back in forty years for another party! The celebration ended with the announcement that two other Public Works employees had reached their 30th year of service to University Park. Needless to say, another cheerful luncheon is being planned for the near future.

CLEAN-UP AND RESTORATION: The clean-up of the Town Park is complete! A big **THANK YOU** to **John Anna**, President of Adirondack Tree Experts, and his staff for a doing a fantastic job. A walk-through with the Town Arborist and others to assess how we might restore the tree canopy and damaged areas has been scheduled for the first week in October. Also, we expect to begin fall replacement plantings of Town street trees by the end of October; affected residents will be notified at least two weeks in advance of any plantings.

GRANTS AVAILABLE: If you are considering planting shade trees on your property this fall (to replace those destroyed in the July 4th storm), keep in mind our Town Grant Program. FROM THE CHIEF

CRIME PREVENTION - Breaking the mirror on a vehicle is not a prank. **Pranks, graffiti, and vandalism are criminal acts.** They are very expensive for the community, display a total disrespect of property, and often lead to more serious criminal activity. As Halloween draws near, residents cringe at the thought of pumpkins being taken (i.e. stolen) from their front yard and smashed. A "Theft," even of "just" a pumpkin, is still a theft. "Graffiti" is art only when it is commissioned. When graffiti is placed on public or private property, then it becomes a criminal offense. **Destroying someone else's property is morally and legally wrong.** In a community, common respect for each other and for another's property is basic to strong values.

Please be vigilant of any type of criminal activity on your property or on your neighbor's property; together, they encompass our community. Please emphasize to your children the importance of respecting other people's property the same as their own property -- and the potential for serious repercussions from committing a criminal act. We all know the value of living in a community that protects its environmental resources and capital investments. Unfortunately, when one

person commits a simple act of vandalism, **everyone** pays. **Please report any suspicious activity as soon as it is observed.** Waiting to call the police "until later" makes it very difficult to piece together the crime, gather possible evidence, and locate suspects.

HALLOWEEN: University Park is a popular venue for area "trick-or-treaters." Many parents and children enjoy the safe atmosphere in UP and the traditional activity of walking through the neighborhood and celebrating Halloween; our streets are safe and the community is friendly. As always, please be especially careful when driving through Town on Halloween when so many children are out walking in the dark evening hours. Also, be alert for any mischievous behavior that may be committed, usually by a very few unsupervised delinquents, and report such behavior to the UPPD immediately.

"TRICK-OR-TREAT" in University Park will be held on Tuesday, October 31st, between 6-9 PM. All residents wishing to participate in this activity should turn on their porch lights. **"Trick-or-Treaters" and their parents are asked to approach only those homes with lighted porch lights** during that time period. The UPPD has free reflective Halloween bags to distribute to UP children. The bags are available at the UPPD station in the Town Hall or by requesting one from any UPPD officer. Keep your evening safe and fun by observing these **Halloween Safety Tips:**

- ◆ Go trick-or-treating with a grown-up
- ◆ Only visit people you know
- ◆ Make sure your costume fits properly
- ◆ Be sure your costume (& your mask) doesn't obstruct your vision or hearing
- ◆ Choose to wear brightly-colored clothing
- ◆ Watch and listen for cars
- ◆ Carry a flashlight and a cell phone with the UPPD number on your speed dial
- ◆ Don't eat any treats until you show them to your parent or another trusted adult.

ITEMS TO REMEMBER

❖ **YARD WASTE:** Wednesday is the day designated for yard waste collection in UP. Since yard waste is composted rather than taken to the landfill, it is important to **keep it free of trash, rocks, or other debris** that might damage the machinery. To keep our

Town looking beautiful, only put out yard waste on the day before collection.

❖ **BULK TRASH:** Please call the Town Hall and arrange a pick-up time. Please wait to place the items at the curb until the designated day. **NOTE:** A \$20 fee is assessed on each item that contains Freon (i.e. air conditioners, refrigerators, freezers).

❖ **BLUE BINS** (Thursday or Friday): Blue Bins are for newspaper and mixed paper recycling. Put **telephone books, magazines, paper boxes, envelopes, cardboard AND NEWSPAPERS** in this bin and place it at the curb on your Thursday (or Friday) mixed-paper recycling day. **NOTE:** Waxed paper, Styrofoam and any paper food containers contaminated with food particles are not acceptable. Please place the bin at the curb before 7 AM.

❖ **YELLOW BINS** (Thursday): Yellow bins are for all non-paper recyclables. Put **glass, metal & aluminum cans, and plastic containers #1 and #2** in this bin and place it at the curb on the Town-wide Thursday recycling day. Please place bin at the curb before 7 AM.

❖ **TRASH TOTERS & RECYCLING BINS:** Remember not to put out these items earlier than the day before your scheduled pick-up. Likewise, it is the responsibility of each resident to **return these items from the curb on the same day** following your pick-up time. **NOTE:** If stored outside, **toters and bins must be placed out of view from the street** at the side or back of one's home.

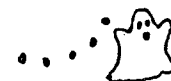
❖ **HELP PREVENT CRIME:** Display a blue and white "UP" sticker on the driver's side of your car's back bumper or on the driver's side lower back window. The stickers are an important part of our Neighborhood Watch Program. **They enable the Town police and other residents to recognize a UP vehicle immediately.** Please pick up one at the Town Hall (M-F, 9 AM-5 PM).

Beginning with this month's Newsletter, "The Permit Corner" will present detailed information on coping with the permit process. As everyone who has had to obtain a permit knows, getting a permit can be frustrating, whether it's from the Town, the County, or both. This first column concerns one of the most baffling projects that might require a permit -- constructing a retaining wall. **If the retaining wall will be less than two feet in height**, neither the County or the Town require a permit (unless the wall will lie within two feet of your property line). **If the retaining wall will be over two feet in height**, then both County and Town permits are required. Retaining walls over two feet high may pose a threat of collapsing if they are not properly designed and anchored. For this reason, when you request a permit from the County and the Town, you will need to include a drawing or a sketch of the design, showing its dimensions and indicating its location on your property. The County requires this drawing prior to their issuing the permit.

If your retaining wall is over six feet in height, or if it involves a complex construction technique, you may be required to get a variance from the County and/or be subject to County and Town inspections. It's important to plan ahead to ensure that you will receive your permit in a timely manner. HOLIDAY TRASH COLLECTION

The holiday trash pick-up schedule is as follows: **There will be NO trash collection** pick-up on Monday, **October 9th** (Columbus Day, observed). Monday's collection will take place on Tuesday, and Tuesday's collection will take

place on Wednesday. The collection schedule for Thursday and Friday is unchanged.



HIGHLIGHTS OF THE AUGUST 3rd SPECIAL SESSION

Present were Mayor Tabori; and all Council Members.

Six Consent Agenda were approved unanimously to: **replace a damaged section of fence at 6910 Wells Parkway; repair the garage roof at 6910 Wells Parkway; replace a damaged section of fence at 6515 41st Avenue; replace a fence damaged in the storm at 4305 Tuckerman Street; replace a damaged section of fence at 4212 Van Buren Street; and replace a storm-damaged shed at 4212 Van Buren Street.**

The meeting adjourned at 8:15 PM.



HIGHLIGHTS OF THE AUGUST 21st SPECIAL SESSION

Present were Mayor Tabori; Council Members Carpenter, Fischer, Lucas, Mallino, McPherson, and Winton; Chief Wynnyk, Treasurer Baden, and Attorney Ferguson.

A motion was approved unanimously for **construction of a rear porch at 6812 Pineway** (contingent on receipt of a final sign-off from the County permit department).

The results of Jim Cook's traffic study of Tennyson Road showed that during the months school was in session, 1500 cars/day came through Tennyson Road. During the summer months (when school was not in session), the 85% speed point was below the posted 25 mph limit (i.e. 85% of the cars sampled were at or below that speed).

During public comment on the traffic issue, several studies, presentations,

comments, and suggestions were given. A Sheridan Street resident explained a week-long videotape she had made of the 44th Avenue/Sheridan Street intersection, and from which she had conjectured that 50% of the traffic was non-resident cut-through drivers avoiding Route 1 & 410 congestion. She said a peak of 60 cars/hour used the intersection.

Another resident described the dynamics of using traffic circles and diagonal diverters to better manage in-Town traffic. CM McPherson expressed concern about the "us" versus "them" language being used during the discussion, and felt that even having an informal survey be videotaped, in itself, edged on becoming a "touchy" situation. Mayor Tabori clarified that the key issue affecting the quality of life in UP was not "outsiders" versus "residents," but "traffic volume."

When asked how the peak traffic volume of 60 cars/hour (or a car a minute) was experienced by neighbors on Sheridan Street, a resident replied that their quality of life was affected by excessively loud music (being played in cars), bottles being thrown from cars, aggressive tailgating, and excessive speed on streets where as many as 20 children live. Mayor Tabori proposed several dates for follow-up public traffic forums, to begin before September 21st.

Mayor Tabori reported that a vendor proposal had been received to automate the Town administrative office. Proposal costs were estimated to be \$14,000 to \$20,000 for the first year, which would include installation of all equipment, installation of all software, and a maintenance contract with 12 monthly visits. The Mayor is seeking bids from at least two other contractors.

Chief Wynnyk reported that the first day of school at UPES went well with no problems, and that the new police cruiser had been received and put into service. He said the UPPD is investigating replacing the officers' service weapons, which now are 10 years old. If not replaced, they will need to be re-serviced. In reply to CM Carpenter, the Chief

said an estimated 4,000 or more rounds had been fired, based on twice-a-year training sessions at the firing range. Chief Wynnyk mentioned that the CERT vehicle continues to be outfitted: a radio will be installed and a magnetic ID sign will be placed on the side.

Treasurer Baden reported that costs incurred to date, that were associated with cleanup from the July 4th storm, totaled \$100,500. Expenses included tree takedown and pruning (on the streets and in the Park), overtime for UPPWD, contract labor through July 31st, equipment rental, and other miscellaneous items. The amount does not include any costs associated with personnel or equipment from other jurisdictions. It is anticipated that UP will recover \$5,500 from insurance proceeds. The Mayor forecasted that we will exceed the budget by about \$100,000, which will come from reserves. He also is investigating "Tree-mendous Maryland" and "Gorgeous Prince George's" as possible free or reduced-cost sources for new trees to replant in Town.

Attorney Ferguson reported that the Town Field has a settling issue (in the clay under the newly-installed sod) that has caused the grass to become waterlogged and die. The work still is under guarantee, and the contractor and engineer have been recalled to resolve the problem. Long-term solutions may require digging, which would impact on the team sports activities. An assessment will be made as to whether the Field can be used through the fall months in its current state.

Six Consent Agenda were approved unanimously to: **replace a fence at 4202 Van Buren; replace a fence at 6704 41st Avenue; replace a shed at 6704 41st Avenue; install a fence at 4108 Van Buren Street; repave a driveway at 4004 Van Buren Street; and enclose a rear porch at 6606 44th Avenue.**

Concerning Council Committee updates, CM Fischer offered to serve on the Rules & Regulations Committee. CM Mallino said that the Tree Committee would meet on August 23rd. The meeting adjourned at 9:50 PM.



As fall arrives and your trees and garden naturally prepare for winter, it is a good practice to **cut back any English ivy and kudzu growth on your trees**. Both plants eventually will kill your trees and bushes. English ivy can be removed by cutting out a ring of it around the trunk near the base of the tree. The ivy will die off during the winter, and can be pulled down during spring cleanup. Kudzu, however, needs to be cut down and pulled off as quickly as possible. It will suffocate your trees and bushes by cutting off the sunlight from their leaves. Kudzu is very difficult to remove and kill so be prepared for a arduous task. Because it is fairly prickly, full clothing and work gloves must be worn. Also, it grows very quickly; so once you have cut it back, you need to keep after it, immediately pulling out any new growth by the roots.



UP BUS SERVICE & METRO SHUTTLE

HOLIDAY REMINDER: There is no senior, handicapped, or Metro shuttle bus service on national holidays. Therefore, the UP Town bus will **not be in service on Monday, October 9th**, Columbus Day, observed.

Free door-to-door wheelchair-accessible bus service is available for Town residents. **Senior citizens and handicapped residents who would like transportation to doctors' appointments, shopping, banking, library visits, club meetings, or to visit a neighbor across Town may reserve pick-up times between 10 AM and 2 PM.** Small groups also may use the bus for excursions. Call the Town Hall (301-927-4262) to schedule your weekday pick-up.

A UP Metro shuttle service **runs on the half hour each weekday morning and**

afternoon from numerous stops in Town to and from the PG Plaza Metro Station. **Seven morning runs** are made from **6-9 AM** and **seven afternoon runs** from **4-7 PM**. A map listing the stops is available at the Town Hall.

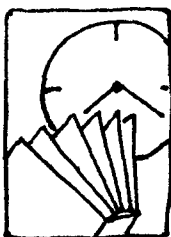

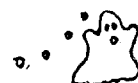
