MAYOR'S COLUMN

September 11 this year was a bluebird day, with a clear blue sky eerily reminiscent of the same date twenty years ago when terrorists used four civilian airplanes to attack the United States. We remember still where we were at that moment when we saw or heard the news, and how we helped each other through. Some of us vowed to never forget, as if we ever could. On this anniversary we again came together to remember.

At memorials elsewhere on September 11, there were speeches—at Ground Zero where the towers of the World Trade Center once stood in New York City, at the Pentagon in Virginia, and near Shanksville, Pennsylvania where United Flight 93 had been taken to earth. Former President George W. Bush spoke at the Flight 93 National Memorial in Pennsylvania. He reflected on what he had seen that day and since in “the America I know” “On America's day of trial and grief, I saw mil-

lions of people instinctively grab for a neighbor's hand and rally to the cause of one another.... At a time when nativism could have stirred hatred and violence against people perceived as outsiders, I saw Americans reaffirm their welcome to immigrants and refugees I saw young people embrace an ethic of service and rise to selfless action.”

In University Park, we gathered at the Town's 9/11 Memorial to reflect on the meaning of these events for our community and for ourselves. The Town's 9/11 Memorial is graceful and simple: a stone bench, base of river rock, and a large stone for each of the 5 Town residents lost when American Airlines Flight 77 was intentionally flown into the Pentagon.

More than 60 of us were there, a large crowd by University Park standards. First responders were there—the

Hyattsville Volunteer Fire Department standing in ranks, fire apparatus at the ready on nearby Wells Parkway, and the University Park Police Department's Chief and officers. We stood within earshot of the Wells Parkway playground and a cricket game underway on the pitch at University Park Elementary School, refreshing reminders of community.

Quiet moments of reflection were facilitated by Pastor Kim McDowell, Diane Teichert, Deborah Rosenfelt, and Pastor John McCoy. Fresh flowers were laid on each of the Memorial's large stones for Sheila Hein, Charles Falkenberg, Leslie Whittington, Zoe Falkenberg, and Dana Falkenberg.

Pastor Kim McDowell closed with an adapted Franciscan blessing:

"May you be blessed with discomfort at easy answers, half-truths, and superficial relationships, so that you may live deep within your heart.

"May you be blessed with anger at injustice, oppression, and exploitation, so that you may work for justice, freedom, and peace.

"May you be blessed with tears to shed for those who suffer from pain, rejection, starvation, and war, so that you may reach out your hand to comfort them and turn their pain to joy.

"May you be blessed with enough foolishness to believe that you can make a difference in this world, so that you can do what others claim cannot be done."

Then, soaring outward within the canopy of arching trees, we heard music ~ a recording of "Zoe," written in memory of 8-year-old Zoe Falkenberg by local resident Eric Olson and performed by local folk group Paint Branch Creek. It was a reflective moment of shared grief, remembrance and meaning.

At its best our community can be welcoming and inclusive, and capable of collective, resourceful responses to new challenges, moving forward.

Back to School Safety Reminders

University Park Elementary School has been in session for approximately a month. The beginning of the school year looked and felt quite different than what we had all grown accustomed to. It's hard to imagine that for the past 18 months there has been very little activity at the school, with most students learning remotely. It was encouraging to see that staff from UPES, parents and students were all excited to return to in-person learning.



Some are returning parents and students while others may be new to UPES. The University Park Police want parents and students to know that we take their safe arrival and departure at UPES very seriously. And while we did not have any serious traffic safety issues in September, with the national shortage of bus drivers we did notice less buses and more pedestrian and vehicular traffic at the school.

Here are some helpful traffic safety tips for parents and guardians whose students attend UPES. Please review and discuss as appropriate with your child:

- When walking your child to school please cross at the crosswalks. We have a new crosswalk near the Word of God Baptist Church parking lot.
- Do not walk with your child in the street or in the UPES staff parking lot. Please use the sidewalk.
- If there is no sidewalk, walk on the edge of the street.
- Always look left-right-left for vehicles or bikes before crossing.
- Never make U-turns while driving in a school zone.
- Never text while driving in a school zone. Everyone should watch the road, not their phones.

- Never pass other vehicles in a school zone.
- Do not discharge students in the middle of the roadway or in the UPES staff parking lot.
- Do not park in the drop off zones.
- Do not park in the bus turn around area in front of the school.
- Please park in the painted parking spaces on Underwood Street and Queens Chapel Road. When parking, do not block any driveways.
- If your child rides a bike to school, make sure they know and obey the rules of the road; the rules are the same for all vehicles, including bicycles.
- Please ensure your child wears a correctly fitted bike helmet, and securely fasten the chin strap.
- Always stay on the right-hand side of the road and ride in the same direction as traffic.
- If possible, try to ride with a parent or someone else. There is safety in numbers.
- Please obey and respect the crossing guards.

The University Park Police understand that getting your child to school safely is a priority and hope that you will follow these basic traffic safety tips and partner with us so everyone may arrive to school safely.

National Prescription Drug Take Back Day *Saturday, October 23, 10 AM-2 PM* University Park Police supports the DEA's safe disposal of drugs and will participate in the National Prescription Drug Take Back Day at the Town Hall. This is an opportunity to protect families from potential misuse and abuse of prescription and over-the-counter drugs, as well as protect the environment. UP residents are encouraged to drop off prescription and over-the-counter drugs during the event. The University Park Police will take the drugs to DEA for proper disposal. Please wear your mask. We will be social distancing.

If you are unable stop by Town Hall during the National Prescription Drug Take Back Day, please follow these simple steps for easy, responsible disposal (also applicable for liquid medication) of drugs: Take unused, unneeded or expired prescription drugs out of their original prescription bottles; crush the medication and put it in a container such as an empty can or sealable bag; mix with coffee grounds, dirt or kitty litter. Discard with regular trash.

Helping Hands University Park



Tree Committee News

Ivy League, Saturday, October 9, 10 AM-12 PM (or any portion thereof) The Ivy League removes ivy from the town's trees to safeguard their health. Volunteers are sought every month to assist with this light exercise effort. Please dress appropriately for prevailing weather and common garden pests and bring a pair of hand clippers and a prying tool (a utility bar, dandelion weeder or large screwdriver). Assemble at the 9/11 Memorial, near southern terminus of Wells Parkway. County guidelines for Covid-19 in effect on 10/9 will be observed. Community Service forms will be signed if provided on site.

Annual Community Tree Planting, Saturday, October 23, 8:30 AM-12:30 PM (or any portion thereof) UP's annual community tree planting will take place this year along the margins of the field surrounding the Pollinator Meadow. All are welcome to assist with the effort which will make the meadow even more desirable for our pollinators. Under the guidance of TPE members, volunteers will plant 25 native shrubs and 3 native trees. As is the custom, Public Works will pre-dig the holes. Volunteers will widen, augment with soil amendments, plant and backfill. We will assemble at the meadow, Adelphi Road between Wells Run and Beechwood Rd. Please bring a favorite shovel. August 16 Council Meeting Highlights

Present (via video and audio conference) were Mayor Carey; Councilmembers (CM) Biermann, Gathercole, Morrissey, Morgan, Wells, Stephen (arrived at 7:33 PM). Excused: McGaughey.

Presentation

Landscaping business owner Dan Wilson of Xavieran Landscaping explained how landscapers use gas-powered leaf blowers, the effects of a proposed ban on gas-powered leaf blowers on their services to University Park residents, and the availability and utility of battery powered leaf blowers for commercial landscape services.

■ Mr. Wilson has a small residential business with 3-4 employees and takes care of ten lawns within University Park as well as additional lawns in College Park and College Heights Estates.

■ The leaf blowers are used in the spring (February-March) to get the yards ready for mulch. During the mowing season (April-October), the leaf blowers are used on each lawn for approximately 10 to 15 minutes. In leaf season (November-December), leaf blowers are

used 3 to 4 times per lawn for approximately 15 minutes for up to 2 hours depending on the lawn.

- His company uses the Echo 755 T-backpack commercial blower.
- A battery-operated leaf blower with two additional batteries costs approximately \$3,200, while a gas-powered leaf blower costs approximately \$480.
- CM Morrissey noted that the Committee on Policy, Rules, and Municipal Structure is now suggesting the target date on banning gas-powered leaf blowers be extended another year to January 1, 2024.
- CM Biermann asked if his company would be willing to use a battery-operated leaf blower if it belonged to the homeowner and Mr. Wilson responded by saying it's an option.
- Regarding the noise ordinance, Mr. Wilson said that the battery-operated leaf blowers are very loud.

Consent Agenda

Motion: To approve the following consent agenda items. Motion approved 6 to 0.

To install a section of 6' fence and a section of 4' fence in the rear yard at 6507 43rd Avenue.

To install a 4' fence at 6909 Forest Hill Drive.

To install a 12'x 18' screened porch with steps at 4102 Tennyson Road.

Block Party/Street Closure for Sheridan Street (from Baltimore Avenue to 44th Avenue), Saturday, September 25, 2021 from 5-10 PM, Ward 1. The police department has been notified and supports this request.

Special Utility Permit for PEPCO SP-2021-06 to prune trees from the Town right-of-way as itemized on the permit and with the conditions as proposed.

Special Utility Permit for Washington Gas SP-2021-08 to work in the Town's right-of-way to install 5 test stations on Queens Chapel Road from East West Highway to Underwood Street with the conditions as proposed.

Public Comment

▪ A member of the Route 1 Community Cares and the Central Kenilworth Avenue Community Development Corporation said that since April 2020 money has been raised for fourteen struggling local restaurants to provide well balanced meals for those in need along the Kenilworth Avenue and Route 1 corridors. These groups are urgently seeking financial help because the

need is growing substantially with hungry families and the struggling restaurants.

- A resident asked Mayor Carey and the Council to consider making a donation from the American Rescue Plan funds to the Route 1 Community Cares.
- A resident reported that in the September 2021 issue of Consumer Reports it stated that battery operated backpack blowers are significantly quieter than their gas counterparts.
- A resident thanked Mayor Carey and the Council for referring the issue on the Guilford Woods/Western Gateway Project to the Development Overview Committee.
- A resident said that in reference to the Guilford Woods Project they hope that the Council can bring clarity to the process since currently the project seems murky and hard for citizens to understand.
- A resident who is against the gas-powered leaf blower owns a battery powered leaf blower that was not expensive and does a good job.
- In reference to the Guilford Woods Project, a resident from Calvert Hills said that there needs to be public input, officials and communities to scrutinize what is happening.
- A resident said that University Park has always made it a point to maintain tree canopy. Guilford Woods is the only natural preserve between University Park and University of Maryland and its existence is important to University Park.
- A resident said that it is very important to convey that communication is critical and there needs to be open discussions so that all residents and stakeholders near Guilford Woods understand the impact it has on the neighborhoods.
- A resident said that there are many compelling reasons the proposed project should not be allowed to move forward on the site currently planned. They encouraged Mayor Carey, Councilmembers and town residents to stand up for the trees and wildlife in Guilford Woods and for the health of the community.
- A resident asked that the language be changed on agenda item 12C Western Gateway Project. He recommends that the Council amend the wording to read "September meeting and other meetings as needed."
- In reference to the Town's Animal Control Ordinance, a resident encouraged the Mayor and Council to do what is necessary to increase the Town's ability to protect residents in the rare instances when the dog owners

are not responsibly managing dogs who have demonstrated dangerous behavior and pose a risk to public safety.

- A resident said that if the Guilford Woods project goes forward, it would be a loss as a community resource if they destroy the beautiful woods.
- A resident said that the new president for the University of Maryland has the authority to make a decision on the Guilford Woods Project and this resident suggests a strong community response.
- Several residents expressed their support on the ban of gas-powered leaf blowers.
- A resident listed several concerns about the current proposal as drafted on the gas-powered leaf blower ban.

Mayor's Report

- Mayor Carey thanked those who attended the Special Session Garage Tour on August 14.
- At the September 7 Council meeting, a hearing on the leaf blower issue will take place prior to the proposed leaf blower ordinance.
- In memory of the five University Park residents that died on September 11, Mayor Carey and Chief Baker are planning a "moment of reflection" this September 11 at 9 AM at the Town's 9/11 Memorial.
- An application has been submitted to the Maryland Department of Natural Resources for a grant from the Community Parks and Playgrounds Program in the amount of \$225,000. If successful, the money will be used to update the Tot Lot.
- In reference to the American Rescue Plan, a total of \$2,592,217 will be received over the next two years. \$1,296,108 has been received.

Committee Reports and Council Comments

Helping Hands of University Park

- Committee Chair Ms. Verrill was able to obtain a significant grant from Prince Georges County that will provide short-term emergency funds to seniors needing financial aid.
- In reference to the Route 1 Community Cares Program and the American Rescue Plan, a resident asked CM Gathercole to encourage Councilmembers to provide a significant amount of money to help the local restaurants and those in need.

Development Overview Committee The next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, September 9. The Committee recently met and topics of discussion included: permitted land use for the area underneath the Mall at Prince

George's as a self-storage facility and the Guilford Woods project.

Motion: *To approve that the Mayor on behalf of the Council send a "no objection" notice to the County about underground storage project at the Mall at Prince George's.* Motion approved 6 to 0.

Police, Traffic and Public Safety Committee

- The Committee did not meet in the month of August.
- Topics of discussion at the September meeting include: traffic calming devices and new projects for the road system.
- Mayor Carey asked CM Wells to attend a walk with County Councilmember Dannielle Glaros at Adelphi Road and Wells Parkway on August 17 to discuss the signal at that intersection and other public safety needs.

Public Facilities and Services Committee The next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, August 19 at 7:30 PM.

Sustainability Committee The Committee met on Wednesday, August 4 and discussed the park plan RFP.

Policy, Rules and Municipal Structure Committee The next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, September 2. The Committee met on Thursday, August 5 and discussed the implementation of gas-powered leaf blower ban for January 1, 2024.

Trees, Parks and Environment Committee The next meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, September 8. The Committee did not meet in the month of August.

Continuing Business

Motion: *To adopt amended Legislative Resolution 21-O-05 to authorize the acquisition of certain real property located at 4201 48th Street, Bladensburg, Maryland 20710 for a public purpose of acquiring the Property for Town vehicle repair, maintenance and storage, and the use of funds in the "Public Works Garage" line item in the FY22 Budget for that purpose.* Motion approved 6 to 0.

Motion: *To adopt amended Legislative Resolution 21-O-06 to amend the Fiscal Year 2022 budget to establish a new revenue line item to receive \$1,296,108.00 in American Rescue Plan (ARP) funds anticipated in the 2022 fiscal year; to authorize allocation of \$375,000.00 of the ARP funds to a newly created line item entitled "W19 Public Works Garage"; with the remaining ARP funds to be allocated to the Unreserved/Undesignated*

line item; and to transfer \$450,000 from the Unreserved/Designated F5 Public Works Garage Line Item to the newly created W19 Public Works Garage line item. Motion approved 6 to 0.

New Business

Town Code Revision

Ms. Ferguson, Town Attorney, briefly explained the proposed changes to chapters 1-4 of the Town Code. Councilmembers were asked to go through the various proposed changes and ask questions and make suggestions. Discussion/questions on the Town Code Revision will take place at the September 7 Council meeting.

Motion: Per Section 16-103 of the Town Ordinances, to consent to the appointment of Dr. Karin Burghardt as a member of the Committee on Trees, Parks and Environment. Motion approved 6 to 0.

Motion: To put the matter of Guilford Woods/Western Gateway Project on the September 9 Development Overview Committee agenda and to ensure that the University and the project proponents, developers as well as any group that wants to attend are given time to speak and discuss this. If the Committee needs to set additional meetings, they will do so. Motion approved 6 to 0.

Administrator and Department Reports

- Summary of permits issued in the month of August: 3 building; 1 pod and 0 vendor.
- The Resident Information Guide is close to completion.

Chief of Police Harvey Baker

- The Crime Report from July 29-August 16: 2 incidents were reported.

- Training: Hand-held automated speed enforcement camera and the Chief attended a training through the States Attorney's office for Investigating Strangulation.
- The 2021 Ford Hybrid SUV should be on the road this week.
- The August 3 National Night Out was well attended.
- Upcoming events: September 11, Moment of Reflection; September 17, Movie Night in the Park; August 17, traffic discussion at Adelphi Road and Wells Parkway.

- The automated speed enforcement camera is in the warning stages; after September 11, citations will be issued.

Director of Public Works Michael Beall

- The Town Hall basement bathroom in the Public Works space is nearing completion.
- Door hangers have been distributed to the homes where tree work is scheduled. This new policy will inform the property owner what is intended and an approximate timeline and gives the homeowner an opportunity to ask questions or express concerns.
- The pickleball striping on the tennis court will be completed on August 19-20. A public pickleball demonstration will be held on September 17 at 5 PM.

- The Town has applied for a Community Parks and Playground Grant in the amount of \$225,000 to update the Tot Lot largely within the existing footprint.
- University Park Elementary School begins classes on Wednesday, September 8. The Town has been getting ready with crossing guards, police force on duty and pushing repair of the school gazebo.
- An invitation has been extended to Prince George's County Board of Education District 3 representative Pamela Boozer-Strother to attend and present at a future Council meeting regarding school boundary changes and other resident interests.
- Town Administrator Mr. Deutsch reported that he expects to have a proposal for Council on the American Rescue Plan funds at the October 4 Council meeting.
- Town Clerk Ms. Marcavitch reminded everyone that the school zone speed safety cameras will start ticketing after September 12. Town Administrator Mr. Deutsch added that since the speed cameras were activated, there have been approximately 6,000 warnings issued.

Town Code Revision

Discussion of proposed changes to chapters 1-4 of the Town Code.

- A cover memo along with the proposed changes with explanations was distributed to Councilmembers for review. The Town Attorney went through and briefly explained the proposed changes.
- Mayor Carey suggested a Council Work Session to go through the Town Code changes very carefully. He will propose dates for a Special Council Work Session.
- Councilmembers were asked to email comments/suggested edits to the Town Attorney and the Town Administrator prior to the Work Session.
- Town Clerk Andrea Marcavitch urged Councilmembers to look closely at the drainage section at the end of Chapter 4. It needs updating.

Public hearing regarding proposed Legislative Resolution 21-O-04 which would prohibit the use of gas-powered leaf blowers after January 1, 2023.

- A resident said that gas-powered leaf blowers are awful polluters and are very annoying, and it is time to ban them.
- A resident said their landscaper said that the ban on gas-powered leaf blowers would result in a large price increase for both the contractor and the consumer.
- A resident said they believe there is an opportunity to be better stewards of the environment but is concerned about the negative impact it is going to have on landscapers.
- A resident sent an email informing the Mayor and Council of their strong support for the Town's proposed ban on gas-powered leaf blowers.

Motion: To continue the vote until the October 4 Council meeting. Motion approved 7 to 0.

Motion: To amend Legislative Resolution 21-O-04 to alter the implementation date to January 1, 2024. Motion approved 7 to 0.

New Business

Motion: To amend the Town Administrator's Employment Agreement between the Mayor and Common Council of the Town of University Park by modifying Section 5 (Benefits/Life Insurance/Retirement) to enable accrual of annual leave in accordance with Section 13.1 of the Personnel Manual which states "eligible part-time employees accrue leave proportional to a 40-hour week." Motion approved 7 to 0.

The meeting adjourned by consent at 9:51 PM.

Bruce William Burrows, 79, died July 22, 2021, at his home in University Park. He was longtime resident born November 23, 1941 in Utica, New York. After graduating high school in Whitesboro, NY, Bruce attended Denison University in Granville, OH where he earned a B.A. in Philosophy in 1963. Shortly after graduating, Bruce entered the US Air Force as a 2nd Lieutenant where he served for four years. During his service in the Air Force, he got an opportunity that would shape the rest of his career. He was selected to work on an early computer system being piloted at his duty station in Big Springs, TX. He had a habit of giving out Sacagawea \$1 coins as a token of his appreciation to anyone who made an impact on him, from a local politician at a town meeting to a cashier at McDonald's who provided him with great service. A Celebration of Life will be held at Redeemer Lutheran Church, 3799 East West Highway, Hyattsville, on Sunday, October 10, at 1 PM. Donations in memory of Bruce may be made to organizations he supported including Planned Parenthood or the Brady Campaign to Prevent Gun Violence.

Geraldine Marie Woodworth, a longtime resident known as Jerry, died at her home in UP on September 12 after a long and painful illness. Jerry Woodworth grew up on Newton Street in Brookland, close by the houses of many religious orders. Many priests and nuns were regular guests of the family and became lifelong friends. Jerry graduated from the Academy of Notre Dame in Washington, DC, the University of Maryland and then the University of Pennsylvania, where she was in the first group to specialize in dental hygiene. In retirement, Jerry lived with her mother and took care of her and other relatives in their final years. She also enjoyed spending time at her condo in Rehoboth Beach in the off season. Jerry attended daily Mass for many years until her illness made it impossible. She had a wide circle of friends from her church and her neighborhood. The family would like to thank all those who helped care for Jerry in her long illness, and the many loving friends and neighbors who visited and gave her comfort. Please consider using compostable bags when picking up after your dog and only dispose of in *your* trash can or a public trash can. **Dog Bites** It's unfortunate, but dog bites do happen. Here are Prince George's County's guidelines of what to do in the case of a dog or animal bite. Immediately soak the wound in soapy water and scrub the bite area gently. Dry the wound and apply an

antiseptic such as iodine. Seek medical attention immediately. Report the bite to the Prince George's County Police Department at 301-333-4000 and the Health Department at 301-583-3750. Please report to UP Police Department as well in case a Public Safety Alert is needed. Try to have someone keep the animal in sight. If you know where the animal lives, notify the owner so they can contain the animal. Contact the Animal Services Division (ASD) at 301-780-7200 if the animal is still at large and in the area. If the animal is not owned or the owner is unavailable, call ASD to have it picked up and/or quarantined. 
Community Mosquito Control Program

In November, clean them out (all plastic parts can be put in the dishwasher—don't heat dry) and store them in an enclosed space, away from winter weather. Traps that are exposed to temperatures below freezing for an extended period can shatter, making them unusable for next year. 



The Police Department is at Town Hall (6724 Baltimore Avenue). Residents are reminded to call 911 for emergencies or to report suspicious activity and a UP Officer will be dispatched. Residents should report non-emergency request for police service to Prince George's County Police Dispatch Non-Emergency line to request a UP Officer. If a resident has a question for the University Park Police, please call the office Monday-Friday from 8 a.m.-4 p.m.

National Prescription Drug Take Back Events

The police department organizes National Prescription Drug Take Back events in April and October every year at Town Hall. Residents are encouraged to drop off prescription and over-the-counter drugs that are no longer needed or expired during the event. The UP Police take the drugs to the DEA for proper disposal. Visit the website calendar or Chief's Blog for the next event date.

Reporting Traffic Issues

Residents can report traffic issues online. Visit www.upmd.org/Traffic to make a report.

Leash Law

By law, all dogs and cats must be leashed when away from their owner's property. All dog walkers must bag their pet's waste and deposit in their or a public trash can.

Building Permits

All residents planning to initiate any construction projects on their property must contact the Town Clerk's office to determine whether a Town permit is required. An info graphic is available to assist residents in determining when a permit is required, visit www.upmd.org/Permit-Info. Town building permit applications must be received by the Town Clerk's office no later than five (5) days before a Council meeting. Residents who apply should plan to attend the Council meeting. The Town Building Permit Application can be found online at www.upmd.org/BuildingPermitApp.

Rentals Require Permits

Anyone intending to rent or lease a residence in University Park must obtain a rental permit. All owners who re-

side in their home and rent to no more than one other person are exempt from the requirement. Rental licenses cost \$400 per year and provide a yearly inspection program for all licensed rental properties. The License Application is at www.upmd.org/Licenses.

Parking Permits

Residents who rent and any resident who lives on a street with a 2-hour parking restriction limitation may obtain a parking permit from the Town Clerk's office. View the Town Code Section 9-104 at www.upmd.org/Code to learn which streets have restricted parking.

UP Vehicle Stickers

Homeowners may obtain one blue and white UP sticker per licensed vehicle for free. Display the sticker on the driver's side of your car's rear bumper or low on the rear window. Contact the Town Clerk's office to obtain a sticker.

Town Bus Services

All Town bus services are suspended during the COVID-19 emergency. Any changes to service will be posted on our website at www.upmd.org/bus.

Trash & Bulk Trash Collection

Trash is collected from the green cart on Tuesdays. Place the cart outside at the curb by 7 a.m. To arrange for a Tuesday bulk trash pick-up, visit www.upmd.org/Bulktrash. All mattresses and box spring must be bagged for collection. The Town requires a \$20 payment (cash or check only) for each item containing refrigerants or other gases, including air conditioners, dehumidifiers, freezers and refrigerators. Checks should be made out to the Town of University Park and submitted to the Town Clerk prior to scheduling the pick-up. Visit www.upmd.org/trash for a detailed list of unacceptable items that will not be collected. Items such as TVs and electronics will not be collected. Residents can bring these items to the semi-annual electronics recycling events or to the Brown Station Landfill in Upper Marlboro.

Trash & Recycling Carts

Do not put trash and recycling carts out earlier than the night before your scheduled pick-up days. It is the resident's responsibility to return the cart from the curb on the same day after pick-up. Carts stored outside must be out of view from the street. If the most convenient place to locate your carts is a visible one, consider installing wooden surrounds, barrier walls or lattice and plants.

Yard Waste and Compost

Yard waste and compost are collected on Mondays. Yard waste is composted rather than taken to the landfill, so it is important to keep it free of trash, rocks and other debris. Bamboo is considered trash. Please put yard waste out only on the evening before collection in a bin or

brown paper bag. **Plastic bags are prohibited.** To participate in the compost program, email Public Works Director Mickey Beall at mbeall@upmd.org. For more information, visit www.upmd.org/Compost.

Recycling

Recycling is collected from the blue recycling cart on Thursdays. Place the cart outside at the curb by 7 a.m. Plastic bags and all other sheet-like plastic are prohibited from County and Town recycling. Items for collection:

- many plastics including food containers numbered 1-7, cups and tableware, flowerpots and Rx containers
- clothes hangers
- all glass except mirrors, light bulbs, broken glass and windowpanes
- mixed paper including telephone books, magazines, boxes, rinsed milk & juice aseptic cartons, envelopes and newspapers, etc.

•some metal including aerosol cans, aluminum foil, aluminum and metal food & beverage containers

Please rinse all containers so they are free of food and grease. Labels, tabs and lids are allowed. Dry cell batteries weighing less than two pounds may be recycled at the Town Hall. Please pad the positive end of each battery with a strip of tape.

Leaf Collection

Town Public Works crews collect leaves by vacuum from November through early January. Residents should rake their leaves up to the curb line for collection. *Do not rake leaves into the gutters or street. Please keep leaf piles free of sticks, stones and other debris, as they can damage the vacuum equipment.*

Snow Removal

All residents (including renters) are required to remove snow from their public front sidewalks within 24 hours after the snow has stopped. For more information including snow emergency parking restrictions, visit www.upmd.org/Snow-Winter-Operations.

Electronics & Paint Recycling, Paper Shredding

Every spring and fall, the Town holds a recycling and paper shredding event at the University Park Elementary School. Residents may bring household electronics for recycling and papers for shredding at no cost. Hard drive destruction is available for a nominal fee and paint recycling is available for \$5/can. Visit www.upmd.org/Recycling-List for a detailed list of acceptable/unacceptable items.

Tax Address

Be sure to use University Park (not Hyattsville) as your address on your Maryland income tax forms. Designating University Park as your residence address helps ensure that the Town receives its appropriate share of state taxes for Town services.
